The existing *Firearms Marking Regulations* under the *Firearms Act*, scheduled to come into force on December 1, 2018, are being deferred until December 1, 2020

The Vital Four ACTS of Firearm Safety

Assume every firearm is loaded
Control the muzzle direction at all times
Trigger finger must be kept off the trigger and out of the trigger guard
See that the firearm is unloaded

PROVE it safe.

Point the firearm in the safest available direction
Remove all ammunition
Observe the chamber
Verify the feeding path
Examine the bore each time you pick up a firearm

EVERYONE NEEDS TO SIGN IN WHEN AT THE RANGE!!

You cannot sign in anyone (for Free) on your Memberships. (if you don't have a Membership Card you have to have a Day-Pass displayed on you)

Sweeping your brass/steel/empty hulls off the concrete and/or leaving them on the ground is <u>not acceptable.</u> Please clean up after yourself. We have a lot of range users that do not know the rules (Day-Pass Users or New Members that haven't taken the mandatory "Orientation Course") please educate anyone not cleaning up after themselves. Extra buckets have been put at each range, these are not garbage buckets they are to be used for Brass Cartridges (recycle) on the R/P and M/P Range, shotgun shells on the S/G Range. All garbage (paper, plastic, cardboard) goes into the garbage cans.

Please print your Name/Member Number when you sign in, we **NEED** to be able to read what you **Write / Print**. **YOU MUST INITIAL THE ACKNOWLEDGEMENT THAT YOU KNOW THE RULES OF THE CLUB**

Colwood PPC Introduction to Handguns and PPC Course

On November 1st and 2nd, the Colwood Police Pistol Combat (PPC) club ran the second of its bi-annual Introduction to Handguns and PPC course on the RP range at VFGPA, with a total of 13 students attending the training supported by a large group of volunteer coaches and safety officers from the club. The students attended a classroom training session on Friday the 1st led by Dom Piluso, David Michaud, Mike Dryburgh and Gerry Vaux, introducing them to the various revolvers and handguns used in PPC shooting, as well as an introduction to the principles of marksmanship required for safe and effective handling of the firearms on the range. On the Saturday, the students arrived at the range and were greeted with uncharacteristically warm weather for November, and they spent the day putting into practice the skills and techniques they had been introduced to the previous evening, with David Michaud once again leading the team of coaches and safety officers through the day as they imparted their skill and experience to the students.


The course is a benefit to both those new to handguns as well as those with experience, as we spend a great deal of time focussing on the critical marksmanship skills of trigger control, grip, stance, sighting, positional shooting and applied marksmanship. The instructor to student ratio is usually 1:1, and the instructor tailors the training to the level of the shooter being coached. An added benefit of this course is the fact we conduct the course using our clubs Smith and Wesson Model 10 revolvers, and the chance to gain some experience safely handling and firing these classic revolvers, given how rare they are today, is something the students always enjoy. All equipment, including firearms, ammunition, and belts and holsters are provided as a part of the course. Students also earn their VFGPA holster certification as part of completing this course.

For those unfamiliar with PPC, it is a competitive shooting sport that uses both Semi-Automatic pistols and Revolvers in 38 calibre or greater to shoot a series of competitive matches, both strong hand and weak hand, unsupported and supported behind barricades, from the prone, sitting, kneeling and standing positions at ranges of between 3 yards out to and including 50 yards. You can read some background at www.colwoodppc.com and on the national website for the Canadian Police Combat Association at www.cpca-ppc.org. Here on Vancouver Island we shoot a monthly match, which rotates between the ranges of VFGPA, the Nanaimo Fish and Game Association and the North Saanich Rod and Gun Club, typically culminating in a Championship in October.

Overall another very successful course and a great group of students, a number of which have now decided to join the Colwood PPC club and will attend their first match with the club on 9 November 2019. The next course will take place in the spring, details can be found at www.colwoodppc.com, and the next two club matches are 9 November at VFGPA and 21 Dec in Nanaimo if you are interested in coming to see what takes place during a PPC competition. We are actively seeking new members, and would be happy to help get new competitors onto the firing line, offering any assistance we can, please reach out via the club website if interested at anytime.









SIAS Report

Our season starts back up in March with a SIAS Range Safety Course being held in February for anyone that is interested in joining our sport. There is also a movement afoot to hold "2 gun" matches next year which would see people use pistol calibre carbine rifles along with handguns to compete in matches. We have rallied our SIAS members and asked them if they would be willing to learn how to teach both the Holster and Handgun Essentials Courses that the VFGPA offers for those new to our range. The response has been quite positive.

We held a "Train the Trainer" class for the Holster Course on December 1st, we had 17 people attend including a member of the Alberni Fish and Game Club who wanted to take home information for future courses at that Club. We added 16 people to our roster of future Instructors. We are holding a Train the Trainer session for the Handgun Essentials Course on December 8th, so we are hoping to have a group of names to add to our Instructors roster from that course as well.

We have also had interest from the Cowichan Fish and Game Club who are sending down some of their RSO's to learn more about Handgun safety on the range.

A SIGHT TO SEE

Every Bullseye and pistol or iron sights shooter will know that the ten ring will be elusive if the front sights are not crystal clear.

Many of us are at an age where we support eye ware. Eye glasses are of course marvelous. We can see near and far, shift from reading and to the mountain tops instantaneously. We have bifocals, trifocals, graduated lenses and transition lenses. And therein lies the challenge for us as shooters. These all work well day to day until we desperately want to consistently try to maintain a 36 inch focal point and crystal clear front sights.

That quest led me to meet Dr Stephen Taylor at the Mayfair Optometric Clinic.

When I arrived everyone was very welcoming. First order of business was an eye health exam and the Optometric technician has access to state of the art diagnostic equipment.

All that complete and time to meet Dr. Taylor. He reviews the diagnostic work up data and completes a comprehensive "let's have a look at your eyes" session.

Then a summary of clinical findings and a reality check on vision as a senior.

Then things change. Dr. Taylor is an excellent and well respected Optometrist but he is also an active participant in a number of shooting disciplines. He pulls out a pad and paper and demonstrates the vision complexities of light entering the retina and our challenge to focus the 36 inch sight picture. He then brings out these strange looking set of glasses and from the examination data he begins to calibrate the settings I will need to achieve my goal.

We walk over to a nearby room where a target is already fixed to the wall and he unboxed a toy but realistic looking pistol. You just know he has done this before! Try this he says. I position myself to test this out and quite happy at first glance. He does a little more adjustment and whow perfect front sight clarity. This is the Holly Grail for most pistol shooters.

We wrapped up the visit with a great chat about our shared passion(s), he is a car guy as well.

Specs arrive next week and eye have great expectations.



Malahat Adventure Skills Park (Concept Plan)

As previously announced, the board is developing a plan for use of the property north of the shotgun range. In view of the litigation assault on the operations of the Salt Spring Island range and other clubs, the board is also considering new acquisitions for sound buffer.

With board approval, for rezoning purposes and general convenience of reference, the public face of the initiative has been conceptually called the "Malahat Adventure Skills Park," into which I have bundled the access and archery portfolios. Additional room to operate is clearly required to mitigate the threat to firing range operations from lead and noise, but I see these as symptoms of the real threat, which is the long-term social assault on the legitimacy of firearm ownership and rural way of life generally.

What we really need is a social buffer. Anyone with children knows the first thing humans do when we need something – we name it. Hence, the **Malahat Adventure Skills Park**.

Rezoning and acquisition of new properties is a long-term initiative, so my plan is to do what we can with what we have in the interim.



While the summer job students put a lot of work into general grounds maintenance that may go unnoticed, the crowning achievement for their effort over the summer is a trail on an old skid road out past the airsoft range to a fantastic lookout with an incredible high-elevation view of the Saanich Inlet. We will be looking at ways to see if it may be possible to descend the cliff and reach the club water-frontage with a rope-assist trail.

We have a kid & mom friendly place to learn and practice outdoor skills, a clubhouse, range, and 3D trail that connects the basecamp to the lookout, and we have waterfront off some of the best prawning grounds anywhere. Contact Terrance for information! access@vfgpa.org mobile: 250-642-2917



Province taking steps to prevent deadly deer disease in B.C.

The Province is implementing a mandatory sampling program that requires hunters to submit the heads from deer harvested in **wildlife management units 4-1, 4-2, 4-3, 4-4, 4-5, 4-6 and 4-7** in the Kootenay Region, after Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks discovered five animals with Chronic Wasting Disease 60 km south of the B.C. border.

The Province has been monitoring for the disease since 2002, targeting the Peace and East Kootenay Regions as high-risk areas for disease entry due to its presence in Alberta and Montana. No infected animals have been found in B.C so far, however, more sampling is needed to inform any additional response.

The provincial Wildlife Health Program is calling on all hunters, especially those in the Peace and East Kootenay, to bring deer, moose and elk heads to drop-off locations for testing. Starting **September 1, 2019** and ending **December 20, 2019**, hunters will be required to submit the heads of mule deer and white-tailed deer harvested in specific wildlife management units along the southern BC border in the Kootenay Region.

Anyone encountering an animal exhibiting the symptoms of Chronic Wasting Disease (thin, drooling, poor coordination, stumbling) should report it to the provincial Wildlife Health Program at 250-751-3219 or the Report all Poachers and Polluters hotline at 1-877-952-7277.






Victoria Fish & Game Club Chronograph is now available for rental!

Introduction to black powder course success!

I had the pleasure of leading our first ever 'Introduction to Black Powder Shooting' course; a joint effort of the Malahat Marauders Re-enactors and the Victoria Fish and Game Protective Assn. on October 26 at the Victoria Fish and Game Club's Malahat Range. Black powder training has traditionally been done primarily on the range when someone showed up at a club shoot with a gun they didn't know how to operate. Because such training was variable in content and quality, we decided to formalize it a bit, so that new shooters could safely start off with proper instruction. We had a small class of 5 in attendance; a few of whom had never handled a firearm of any sort. The classroom session lasted about 2 hours, during which we covered:

- * The history of muzzle-loading arms from 1300 to present day (briefly)
- * The anatomy of traditional ML guns (both flintlock and percussion)
- * Black powder and its properties, as well as how to safely handle and store it
- * Basic equipment needed to load and shoot; what they can buy, and what they can make.
- * Patches and ball; what they are made of, and how to make or get them.
- * POWDER, PATCH, BALL: safe loading procedures, including how to 'prove unloaded'.
- * Discussion of what to do if things go wrong, and the gun doesn't fire. How to safely deal with hang-fire and dry -ball situations.
- * Description of cleaning procedures, and storage of guns.

After a short break, we went down to the range for some hands-on practice of what had been preached. We had other experienced shooters available to safely one-on-one guide the students through actual loading and shooting. VFG recently purchased several identical percussion rifles specifically for this training, and they were put to good use. Everyone did their own loading (one could hear them muttering 'Powder, patch, ball!' under their breath) under supervision throughout the range session; the idea being to get them to the point where they would be fairly comfortable on their own at our next club shoot. Students were encouraged to come out to club shoot days to practice, and to get the opportunity to see (and try) many variants of firearms.

They all shot some gongs, and some also shot bullseye targets (for bragging rights at home), and we finished up with a hands-on gun cleaning session to round things off. Many thanks to Steve, Maurice and Keith who helped out as mentors on the range.

Welcome: Adam, Cory, Doug, Jessie, and Nicole to the sport of black powder shooting.

As this course is considered an introduction to the sport, although in-line and cartridge arms were mentioned, no time was devoted to them; those who wish can extend their knowledge over time. We got back only positive feedback; everybody enjoyed themselves, and the hope is that we can continue to bring new ML shooters into the family in the future as the word about this program spreads.

Firearms Report for Dec 2019

- 1. As reported in my June Region 1 firearms report, Bill C 71 has been passed but so far does not appear to be implemented. The portion most likely to impact most of us is that it requires a reference number for both the transferor and the transferee, for all guns not just restricted and prohibited guns. If we are buying a rifle or shotgun in a store during daytime business hours, that is a minor problem but if the transfer is outside of 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, there is a good chance that means waiting until the next business day to complete the transfer. So far, the government has not committed itself as to what defines a transfer and I suspect that probably will mean anytime a firearm changes hands for any reason where the transferor is beyond arms reach.
- 2. Perhaps not surprising is that Bill Blair is now the Minister of Public Safety. During his previous career as police chief in Toronto, he had a reputation for being very anti gun ownership. Surprisingly he has recently somewhat come out on the side of handgun owners by saying that he does not support the banning of legally owned handguns
- 3. Of concern is that a person's records will be examined over their lifetime before issuing a PAL instead of the current 5 years. That is of concern because at present a license can be delayed or denied because of a death in the family or divorce. At present, if the person waited 5 years they could answer no to questions relating to the incident. Now that option is no longer open to them.
- 4. Related to point 3 is that it is extremely difficult to challenge a decision to withhold a license. Firearms Officers more or less do not answer phone calls and rarely answer emails. Even sending contact information for references who support the issuing of a license seem to hit a brick wall.
- 5. Trudeau has said a number of times that he will allow cities to ban the possession of firearms within their boundaries. Toronto in particular seems eager to take that route but I have to wonder whether that is legal under rights governed by civil liberties legislation
- 6. What does seem probable is that Trudeau will ban the possession of so called "assault rifles" and that term appears to be used to described any semi auto rifle which has a military appearance. I have seen estimates of 250,000 guns which meet that description. The Liberal government appears to be prepared to spend \$250 million dollars over 2 years to compensate owners for the loss of their guns. If that comes to pass, the key word is "fair market value" and I am a pessimist when it comes to fair value coming anywhere close to true replacement cost.

I believe in the past, it has been reported that the Canadian Wildlife Service has recommended the banning of all lead ammunition. For the time being that appears to have faded from view. Were a ban to be declared, the single biggest impact would be on 22 rimfire ammunition.





ELK/BEAVER LAKE INITIATIVE and WATERSHED MANAGEMENT PLAN

Two plans are currently underway to address high nutrient levels in Elk/Beaver Lake. These plans aim to reduce frequency of blue-green algae, improve fish habitat and manage growth of Eurasian milfoil.

The development of a **watershed management plan** is underway to address external sources of nutrients through a public engagement process. External sources of nutrients come from various land use activities around the lake (urban or agricultural) as well as natural processes that bring nutrients into the lake. CRD staff are currently facilitating a public engagement process to develop the plan to address this source of nutrients.

The development of an **in-lake remediation plan** is also underway to address internal sources of nutrients in Elk/Beaver Lake. These nutrients have accumulated over decades in the lake and bottom sediments and are continually recycled back into the water column under low-oxygen conditions. The in-lake remediation process is guided by expert consultants and an intergovernmental working group. On September 11, 2019 staff brought forward a Staff Report and Business Case to the CRD Board outlining the environmental, recreational, community and economic values of the lake (over \$10 million annually) and a recommendation to remediate the lake.

The CRD Board approved the recommendation to move ahead with the in-lake remediation of Elk/Beaver Lake, subject to receiving at least 50% capital grant funds for the project. This recommendation includes the installation of oxygenation systems in Elk/Beaver Lake to improve water quality at a capital cost of \$1.4 million and ongoing operational costs of \$100,000 -\$150,000 annually. Staff are now working to develop a funding plan to support the project and plan to publish a Request for Proposals (RFP) to develop a detailed remediation plan (sizing and siting) this winter.

Lastly, staff are working to conduct a survey of the Eurasian milfoil coverage and abundance on the lake (to collect baseline information), install a hydrometric station at the Beaver Lake dam to measure continuous lake levels and water flow, and update signage around the lake for improved blue-green algae public notices and advisories.

LIMITED ENTRY HUNTING (LEH) PROPOSED CHANGES

Changes to the Limited Entry Hunting (LEH) system were discussed at the Vancouver Island Region (BCWF) members meeting held in Victoria December 01.

Previous surveys have indicated that hunters are not satisfied with the current LEH system due to the low percentage odds of receiving an LEH authorization for heavily over-subscribed hunts. Hunters generally favour some form of enhanced odds system which continues each year to increase your odds of being drawn. In 2018 there were 160,659 LEH applications for 19,872 authorizations covering nine species. The number of CORE grads has more than doubled in the last 12 years compared to the previous 12 year period. Over 98,000 new hunters have graduated between 2007 and 2018 and over 46,000 between 1995 and 2006. In 2018 there were 105,837 hunting licences sold and 470,000 FWID (Fish & Wildlife Identification) numbers.

In the ten year period between 1997 and 2006, there were 171,003 individual hunt draws. However, more than 1 in 4 draws were not used (ie. hunter did not buy a species licence or tag). Even more disturbing, a total of 15,535 of those authorizations went to people who did not even buy a hunting licence.

To combat some of these problems, the Valley Fish & Game submitted resolutions to Vancouver Island (Region 1, BCWF) which passed unanimously at the meeting.

MOTION #1: Therefore be it resolved that the BCWF urge the provincial government to work with the BCWF's Allocations Committee to make changes to the current Limited Entry Hunting draw system. These changes may include a combination of any, or all, of the different systems in use throughout North America (ie. random, pool, priority or points).

Further be it resolved that the BCWF urge the provincial government to look at all other possibilities which will help minimize the number of unused tags (or authorizations) and maximize hunter opportunity, including, but not limited to: - requirements for purchasing a licence before applying for LEH draws - more shared hunt opportunities

MOTION #2: Therefore be it resolved that the BCWF and its Allocation Committee urge the provincial government to require all LEH applicants to have purchased a hunting licence for the current year prior to applying for a Limited Entry Hunting draw.

These resolutions will be submitted, with Region 1 support, to the BCWF Annual General Meeting for a vote during the first week of April in Nanaimo.

PROPOSED HANDYDART FACILITY IN VIEW ROYAL

The Esquimalt Anglers' Association wrote the Minister of Transportation, Claire Trevena, on October 08 expressing concern and opposition to a proposed HandyDART facility to be built adjacent to Craigflower Creek in View Royal.

A reply was received, dated October 25, from the Minister. In part, she states "B.C. Transit is committed to engaging with View Royal staff on the HandyDART facility's design, possible improvements and environmental protections. Furthermore, B.C. Transit has committed that the facility's designer will be contractually obligated to ensure the project meets all View Royal's existing bylaw requirements, as well as other provincial and regulatory requirements, including streamside protection and enhancement areas."

These same assurances were promised by the Minister and the Ministry of Transportation for work being conducted at the McKenzie Interchange. However, on several occasions, sediment contamination of Colquitz River occurred. Similarly, the CRD promised high environmental protection standards during the bio-solids pipeline crossing of Colquitz at Marigold and Interurban. The contractors' environmental management plan failed to avoid excessive sediment contamination of the coho salmon and cutthroat trout habitat. This resulted in two successive stop work orders being issued this past August when the sediment contamination was brought to the respective authorities attention.

The Esquimalt Anglers' Association Board of Directors continues to oppose this project at the proposed site, despite the noted environmental protection assurances by Minister Trevena.

The book lists more than 10,000 entries in 19 big game categories with over 1400 of these being new entries since the previous edition in 2010.

"This is a book for all who have an interest in the outstanding diversity and abundance of big game in British Columbia." "The foundation for the Wildlife Records Club of British Columbia was originally conceived in Kamloops in 1967 with the objective of maintaining a perpetual record of trophy-class big game from British Columbia." Since 1982, operations of the Club have been based on Vancouver Island. The Club continues to qualify volunteer scorers located throughout the province. "Dedicated to wildlife conservation, selective hunting and fair chase, the Club invites the membership of individuals with similar ideals."




NEW VANCOUVER ISLAND DEER BOOK

Copies of the ninth edition (2016) of the Vancouver Island Columbian Blacktail Deer Records are available at a cost of \$10 each. The publication contains an excellent article written by Byron Mason on fifty years with the deer in the Nimpkish Valley. Byron relates the impact of wolf and cougar predation on deer population abundance and hence, hunting success. He also includes 45 years of deer count data from 1970 through 2015.

There is also an article on early cougar hunting where the provincial government paid a bounty of varying amounts on cougars taken between 1870 and 1958. The new edition contains numerous colour photographs of harvested deer as well as record heads and antlers.

Copies of the previous eighth edition (2010) are still available at a cost of \$5.00. The current records list over 2160 entries scoring 100 or more Boone & Crockett points.



Of particular note is the re-scoring of the Norm Hammond buck from 1942. These antlers were the number two head in the previous eighth edition (2010) scoring 139 7/8.

Following a request from the current owner, it was panel scored in March 2015 and is now ranked as the number one Vancouver Island deer with a score of 143 5/8.

VICTORIA FISH & GAME ANNUAL BIG GAME COMPETITION

Hunters are reminded that Blacktail deer taken in MU 1-1 through 1-13 by Victoria Fish & Game members are eligible for the five trophies available each year. Deer must be field dressed which means that the heart, liver and kidneys (edible portions) are the only internal organs which can be included when the animal is weighed.

Deer must be weighed on Club scales by the caretaker/manager or his designate.

The official weigher reserves the right to refuse weighing any deer which arrives in an unpresentable condition. Lungs must be removed and body cavity wiped dry with a rag or paper towels. Deer 160 pounds and over taken with a rifle and 140 pounds and over taken by bow and arrow must be witnessed by an executive member at time of weighing. Please contact the Club caretaker/manager or Wayne Zaccarelli to make arrangements. Hunters are reminded that access to club facilities is restricted to daylight hours with the gate locked progressively earlier through the hunting season. Please ensure that you confirm the time gates are locked and show up at least a half hour earlier.

In addition, the Victoria Fish & Game Bear trophy is awarded annually for the largest Black bear taken by a Club member. Boone & Crockett Club scoring is used to determine the largest entry. Boundaries are again MU 1-1 through 1-13.


