STEELHEAD STREAM CLASSIFICATION POLICY

The provincial government is currently conducting a five year review of their steelhead stream classification policy and accepting public comments until July 31. The overall purpose of this policy is to place priority on the conservation of wild steelhead stocks and to manage risks associated with hatcheries to minimize risks to wild stocks. The policy recognizes that angling benefits can be derived from hatchery use, and outlines criteria necessary to meet the 'hatchery augmented' classification. Default classification is 'wild', and procedures provide management approaches for the two classifications. Most notably, all wild streams are non-retention only, and management priorities will reflect the conservation status of both 'wild' and hatchery augmented' streams. Streams classified as 'hatchery augmented' will be enhanced for the purpose of providing harvest fisheries, not to rebuild natural production.

The above comments are the current regulations contained in the Steelhead Stream Classification Policy. The following letter is in response to a February 10 letter from the Amalgamated Conservation Society to the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations concerning hatchery enhancement of Sooke and Goldstream River steelhead.

Dear Mr. Zaccarelli:

Your letter of February 10, 2012 to Honourable Steve Thomson, Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations regarding steelhead (*Oncorhynchus mykiss*) hatchery augmentation and government policy has been referred to me for a response. I apologize for the delay in responding.

Regarding hatchery augmentation, the ministry has supported a variety of hatchery augmentation programs for steelhead on Vancouver Island including both smolt and fry programs. The objective of smolt programs was to promote angling use whereas the objective of fry programs was primary community engagement and education. Fry programs often involved the use of local infrastructure and community members to culture steelhead fry.

Although these community-based projects initially seemed unlikely to negatively impact stocks, declines in steelhead stocks observed in the last decade, due to poor marine survival, has placed many small steelhead stocks into the conservation concern or extreme conservation concern zones. When stocks are in these conservation zones, the removal of even a few adults for fry programs can represent a biologically significant impact to the population and can reduce the ability of these same stocks to recover.

These hatchery programs are evaluated annually to confirm predicted program objectives and hatchery programs which are not meeting predicted objectives and outcomes are adjusted or discontinued. The ministry refers to the Steelhead Stream Classification Policy, which has been in place since 2005 when considering the disposition of hatchery programs and the overall purpose of this policy is to manage the risks in order to maintain healthy, self-sustaining wild steelhead stocks. This policy recognizes that hatchery augmentation may provide angling benefits and addresses the conditions under which streams should be considered as candidates for steelhead hatchery augmentation; however, this policy also recognizes the risks of hatchery augmentation and acknowledges the lack of scientific evidence to support the use of traditional hatchery practices to recover "at-risk" steelhead stocks.

Under the Steelhead Stream Classification Policy, all streams that contain steelhead are classified as:

- (a) "wild" managed to maintain and protect the abundance, distribution and genetic diversity of indigenous steelhead stocks in the province while providing angling opportunities when stock abundance permits;
- (b) "hatchery-augmented" managed to maintain or develop new angling opportunities while minimizing risks to wild indigenous steelhead.

In order for a stream to be classified as "hatchery-augmented" there must be a reasonable expectation of creating a viable angling opportunity in a cost-effective manner and the following criteria are required:

- Systems that have been historically augmented and where continued augmentation is not considered to pose a risk to extant wild stocks or;
- Systems where a wild stock has been depleted or otherwise impacted to the point that recovery is not considered possible or;
- Systems where a steelhead population never existed and potential impacts to other native species have been evaluated and are considered acceptable.

Using the above criteria, streams with a small but viable population, such as the Sooke and Goldstream Rivers, are not appropriate candidates for hatchery-augmentation because there is no likelihood of creating a viable angling opportunity and there is a risk to extant wild stocks.

While the ministry appreciates the efforts of the Amalgamated Conservation Society and the Sooke Salmon Enhancement Society for running hatcheries since the early 1980s, our understanding of the efficacy of hatchery steelhead programs has evolved over the last 30 years. Studies across the west coast of North America clearly demonstrate that hatchery programs are not an effective tool for recovering wild steelhead populations and, in fact, hatchery programs harm, rather than help, these populations. It is worth noting that no steelhead stock in the Province of British Columbia has demonstrated "recovery" through the use of hatchery augmentation despite considerable investments in these programs.

In regards to the Columbia Fuels oil/fuel spill April 16, 2011, the ministry does not believe that hatchery augmentation would benefit the recovery of the steelhead population for the reasons provided above. As recommended in the Steelhead Stream Classification Policy, the ministry instead encourages non-government partners and public involvement groups to undertake projects which promote wild stock recovery through habitat protection, restoration, or enrichment.

The official weigher reserves the right to refuse weighing any deer which arrives in an unpresentable condition. Lungs must be removed and body cavity wiped dry with a rag or paper towels. Deer 160 pounds and over taken with a rifle and 140 pounds and over taken by bow and arrow must be witnessed by an executive member at time of weighing. Dear Mr. Zaccarelli:

Thank you for your email dated June 9, 2012, regarding your members concern over the declining state of the aquatic environment at Elk Lake.

As you may be aware, Elk Lake has had a history of water quality concerns. In 1988, in response to increased public concern regarding the water quality in Elk and Beaver lakes, the Capital Regional District (CRD) and the Ministry of Environment (MOE) undertook an extensive water quality monitoring program. At that time it was also anticipated that increasing residential, agricultural and commercial development in the watershed could potentially affect water quality. Based on the results of this study, ambient water quality objectives were developed for Elk and Beaver lakes in 1992 to help guide management decisions. The goal was to restore and protect the water quality in the lakes so it was acceptable for the designated water uses: recreation and protection of aquatic life. However, very little was accomplished at this time as the objectives were not embraced by local governments. The Elk/Beaver water quality report can be found on line at: http://www.env.gov.bc.ca/wat/wq/objectives/elkbeaver/saanich.html

The findings from the 1992 water quality report indicated that the extensive aquatic plant growth in the lakes, including algal blooms, was caused by high concentrations of nutrients, phosphorus in particular. A phosphorus budget was calculated for Elk Lake, which showed that the majority of phosphorus (approximately 70%) within the lake was a result of internal loading from the hypolimnion or bottom sediments. Other sources of phosphorus identified were septic inflow (18%), Inflow Creeks (9%) and atmospheric loading. During the early land development period around Elk Lake, nutrients bound to sediment particles through land clearing activities, would have been a large external source of phosphorus to the lake. The phosphorus would slowly accumulate in the lake bottom, and under normal lake conditions would be permanently bound to the sediment particles. However under reducing conditions, when oxygen levels become low at the water sediment interface, the phosphorus is released into the overlying water column (internal loading) and becomes available for plankton growth.

Lake management strategies to improve water quality in Elk Lake were recommended in the 1992 report, and included the reduction of phosphorus through various ways, such as aeration, and land management practices. Aeration of Elk Lake would eliminate the physical and chemical conditions at the bottom of the lake that cause internal loading. Land management practices to reduce phosphorus loading from external sources included reduction of livestock access to O'Donnell Creek and the stabilization of eroding stream banks. It was also suggested that the Municipality of Saanich and the CRD should develop a plan to manage storm water run-off from roads, agricultural activities, urban development, and fertilizers from lawns and gardens, as well as develop a septic tank maintenance plan to ensure the tile fields were working.

From 1993 to 1995 the lakes were monitored to determine whether water quality objectives were being met. Additional sampling was conducted by CRD staff in 2006 and MOE regional staff in 2007. All the results consistently showed that water quality objectives were not being met for dissolved oxygen, chlorophyll a and plankton community structure, and that both Elk and Beaver lakes were eutrophic to highly eutrophic (high nutrients).



Some restorative activities have occurred along O'Donnel Creek, where the District of Saanich with local stewardship groups conducted a two year riparian restoration project, which should contribute to improving water quality in the lakes. In 2007, following a report released by Ministry of Health regarding sewer system standards, the District of Saanich passed a bylaw which stated that by the end of 2010, all septic systems will need to be pumped out and/or maintained by a professional, depending on the type of system in place. Assuming this program is enforced, it could greatly help reduce the number of faulty septic systems that may be in place within the Elk and Beaver Lake watershed.

The formation of the Elk-Beaver Lake Recreational Use Advisory group has brought the issue of water quality back to the forefront. While aeration as a restoration option was discussed at the April 24, 2012 meeting, it is still only a theoretical option and a feasibility study would have to be conducted to determine if and what type of aeration was suitable for Elk Lake. The feasibility study could also include the investigation of other restorative options and whether they are suitable or not for Elk Lake, both environmentally and economically.

As indicated in your letter, aeration can be very costly. The Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (MFLNRO), Fish and Wildlife sections do operate many lake aeration systems in other locations around BC. However, these systems are installed and operated to provide fisheries where lake conditions are naturally over-productive as the result of geological or physical conditions, and not the result of human development/activity. While historically on Vancouver Island, the Fish and Wildlife section has been solely managing the aerators on St. Mary, Langford and Glen lakes, they are no longer able to take on this role. The poor water quality conditions in these lakes, and in Elk Lake, are largely a result of historical inputs of nutrients from anthropogenic activities. More recently the onus has been placed on local government agencies to support and manage these aeration systems, in addition to developing watershed plans to manage external sources of nutrients.

That being said, the Fish and Wildlife section does have a vested interest in maintaining fish habitat and fishing conditions and will continue to work with local stakeholders. In 2007, a new aeration system was installed on St. Mary Lake and was almost entirely funded by the North Salt Spring Waterworks District, with little or no involvement from the Regional Fish and Wildlife section. Furthermore, the City of Langford is being encouraged to take the lead on obtaining funds for the aeration replacement project in Langford Lake.

In regards to Elk Lake, the District of Saanich and the CRD are the lead authorities responsible for developing a plan to look at restoration options in conjunction with a review of land use practices and overall nutrient inputs. This recommendation was also put forward in the 1992 MOE water quality objectives report. It would seem reasonable that the Elk-Beaver Lake Recreational Use Advisory group or a technical subcommittee of all the stakeholders would be the ideal group to work on this project. A potential funding source for either the feasibility or implementation of a restoration project is the Habitat Conservation Trust Foundation (HCTF), which receives a large portion of its funds from anglers through the purchase of freshwater fishing licenses.

Open Letter to Resident Hunters re: Moose Population Region 5

Dear Wayne,

The Tl'etinqox-t'in have announced a no-hunting area for the Anaham Range, except for Tsilhqot'in hunters and Tl'etinqox-t'in members who have guide operations. The rationale for this announcement is low moose populations.

Recent inventory (2011/12) has shown significant declines in parts of Regions 5, 6 and 7a. Many of these declines are associated with large-scale salvage logging for mountain pine beetle. There has been a significant increase in wolf populations in all of these areas according to First Nations, trappers, outfitters, resident hunters, and other outdoor users. The Province has put together a task force to deal with the declines in moose populations.

While unfortunate, this decline in moose demonstrates the reality of budget cuts and funding shortfalls for wildlife management in British Columbia. Basic management functions are on life support and have been for more than a decade. Creating healthy and abundant wildlife populations collaboratively rather than fighting over what remains should be the approach taken by all parties.

As a resident hunter, you can drive positive change by contacting your local MLA. A face to face meeting is best, followed by letters and emails. Make sure you request a reply. Remember, your MLA works for you. There are two issues that need to be addressed:

The hierarchy for allocation of fish and wildlife harvest is:

- 1) Conservation
- 2) First Nations needs for food, social and ceremonial purposes
- 3) Resident Hunter
- 4) Non-Resident Hunter (guide-outfitter operations)

1. If there is sufficient moose to allow a harvest after conservation and First Nations needs are met, will government ensure resident hunters have the opportunity to hunt in all crown land areas where a harvestable surplus exists?

2. How much money is going to be committed to moose recovery and what is the timeframe?

Government has treated fishing and hunting in British Columbia as a cash cow for decades with little to no investment in the future. When you manage businesses in this manner, failure is the predictable outcome.

In many of these areas moose have generally been declining since the late 70s/early 80s. Moose recovery in these areas needs to be well funded (millions of dollars) and on the ground efforts need to start in 2013. The expectation is moose experts provide research and that their recommendations are not overridden by politics. The over-arching goal is to establish moose populations which are consistent with levels seen in the early 80s when healthy and abundant moose populations existed.

Contact your MLA and ensure they support and adequately fund science-based fish and wildlife management in British Columbia. The declines in moose are only a symptom of a much bigger problem which affects all wildlife.

Regardless of the reason for the moose decline (if in fact it exists) this appears to be another example of the natives managing the resource instead of letting the government managers do their job. I note that there is no notice of this in the LEH hunts for moose in Region 5. It seems like just as many authorizations in all sub-units as last year. By this, I would assume that the government does not agree that the moose population is down substantially. This may just be another instance of the natives trying to push resident (and non-resident) hunters off 'their' lands (ie. crown land).

CHINOOK REGULATIONS:

Effective June 16 and until July 15, the daily catch limit for Chinook salmon in Areas 19 and 20 from Cadboro Point (Ten Mile Point) to Sheringham Point is two fish over 45 cm., only one of which may be over 67 cm.

DFO has set up three arbitrary Zones based on Chinook escapement to the Fraser River as determined by the Albion Test Fishery which started fishing April 25. To June 11, five (5) Chinook had been caught in the 8 inch mesh Chinook net. A further eight (8) Chinook had been caught in a multi panel net. Based on their number crunching, they estimate an escapement of 30,000 to 73,000 (median 47,060) which falls into Zone 2.

- Zone 1 less than 30,000
 - 2 Chinook; no wild over 85 cm.
- Zone 2 30,000 60,000
- 2 Chinook; only one over 67 cm.
- Zone 3 over 60,000 2 Chinook over 45 cm.
